

Literacy

WALT: distinguish between statements of fact and opinion

Understanding of the World

HISTORY: Historical theme: Crime and Punishment
WALT: explore a study of an aspect or theme in British history that extends pupils' chronological knowledge beyond 1066
WALT: learn about changes in an aspect of social history, such as crime and punishment from the Anglo-Saxons to the present
WALT: develop a chronologically secure knowledge and understanding of British history, establishing clear narratives within and across the periods they study.
WALT: note connections, contrasts and trends over time and develop the appropriate use of historical terms.
WALT: regularly address and sometimes devise historically valid questions about change, cause, similarity and difference, and significance and construct informed responses that involve thoughtful selection and organisation of relevant historical information.
KEY FACTS: Both the types of crimes committed and the punishments given changed through history. Identify one key fact about punishments per time era studied. The police force was created in Victorian times.
KEY VOCABULARY: Law, crime, poverty, retribution, deterrent, reform

SCIENCE: Light

WALT: recognise that light appears to travel in straight lines.
WALT: use the idea that light travels in straight lines to explain that objects are seen because they give out or reflect light into the eye.
WALT: explain that we see things because light travels from light sources to our eyes or from light sources to objects and then to our eyes.
WALT: use the idea that light travels in straight lines to explain why shadows have the same shape as the objects that cast them.
