

Communication and Language

WALT join in with repeated refrains and anticipate key events and phrases in rhymes and stories.
 WALT listen and do for short span.
 WALT respond to simple instructions and respond to instructions involving a two-part sequence.
 WALT use talk in pretending that objects stand for something else in play, e.g., 'This box is my castle.'
 WALT use language to imagine and recreate roles and experiences in play situations.
 WALT use vocabulary focused on objects and people that are of particular importance to them.

Literacy

WALT listen to stories with increasing attention and recall.
 WALT continue a rhyming string.
 WALT link sounds to letters, naming and sounding the letters of the alphabet.
 WALT handle books carefully.
 WALT give meaning to marks they make as they draw, write and paint.
 WALT write own name and other things such as labels, captions.

Physical Development

WALT dress with help, e.g. putting our arms into open-fronted coat or shirt when held up, or pull up zipper once it is fastened at the bottom.
 WALT move freely and with pleasure and confidence in a range of ways, such as slithering, shuffling, rolling, crawling, walking, running, jumping, skipping, sliding and hopping.
 WALT experiment with different ways of moving
 WALT hold a pencil near point between first two fingers and thumb and use it with good control.
 WALT handle tools, objects, construction and malleable materials safely and with control.

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

WALT demonstrate friendly behaviour, initiate conversations and form good relationships with peers and familiar adults.
 WALT confidently talk to other children when playing, and communicate freely about our own home and community.
 WALT initiate conversations, attend to and take account of what others say.
 WALT be aware of the boundaries set, and of behavioural expectations in the setting.
 WALT adapt behaviour to different events, social situations and changes in routine.
 SEAL: WALT describe self in positive terms and talk about abilities.

 WALT show interest in shape by sustained construction activity or by talking about shapes or arrangements.
 WALT use familiar objects and common shapes to create and recreate patterns and build models

WALT investigate the class name and develop a sense of belonging.
 WALT develop an understanding of growth, decay and changes over time.
 WALT look closely at similarities, differences, patterns and change.
 WALT remember and talk about significant events in our own experiences.
