Spoken Language:

WALT: Give well-structured descriptions, explanations and narratives for different purposes, including for expressing feelings

WALT: Listen and respond appropriately to adults and our peers

WALT: Articulate and justify answers, arguments and opinions

Reading:

WALT: Discuss word meanings, linking new meanings to those already known

WALT: Draw on what we already know or on background information and vocabulary provided by the teacher

Writing:

WALT: Read aloud our writing clearly enough to be heard by our peers and the teacher

WALT: Compose a sentence orally before writing it

WALT: Sequence sentences to form short narratives

WALT: Say out loud what we are going to write about

WALT: Re-read what we have written to check that it makes sense

WALT: Discuss what we have written with other pupils

WALT: Form lower-case letters in the correct direction, starting and finishing in the right place

WALT: Use joining words like 'and'

WALT: Use full stops, question marks and exclamation marks at the end of sentences.
