

Literacy

This term the children will be reading **Holes by Louis Sachar**

WALT distinguish between statements of fact and opinion
WALT retrieve, record and present information from non-fiction
WALT participate in discussions about books that are read to them and those they can read for themselves, building on their own and others' ideas and challenging views
WALT explain and discuss their understanding of what they have read, including through formal presentations and debates, maintaining a focus on the topic
WALT Provide reasoned justifications for their views
WALT develop spelling and handwriting skills
Pupils should be taught to:

- plan their writing
- draft and write
- evaluate and edit

WALT recognise vocabulary and structures that are appropriate for formal speech and writing, including subjunctive forms
WALT use hyphens to avoid ambiguity
WALT use brackets, dashes or commas to indicate parenthesis
WALT use semi-colons, colons or dashes to mark boundaries between independent clauses
WALT use passive verbs to affect the presentation of information in a sentence
WALT use the perfect form of verbs to mark relationships of time and cause

WALT listen attentively to spoken language and show understanding by joining in and responding
WALT describe people, places, things and actions orally
WALT engage in conversations; ask and answer questions; express opinions and respond to those of others; seek clarification and help.

Understanding of the World

HISTORY: Historical theme: Crime and Punishment

WALT explore a study of an aspect or theme in British history that extends pupils' chronological knowledge beyond 1066
WALT learn about changes in an aspect of social history, such as crime and punishment from the Anglo-Saxons to the present
WALT develop a chronologically secure knowledge and understanding of British history, establishing clear narratives within and across the periods they study.
WALT note connections, contrasts and trends over time and develop the appropriate use of historical terms.
WALT regularly address and sometimes devise historically valid questions about change, cause, similarity and difference, and significance and construct informed responses that involve thoughtful selection and organisation of relevant historical information.

SCIENCE: Light

WALT recognise that light appears to travel in straight lines.
WALT use the idea that light travels in straight lines to explain that objects are seen because they give out or reflect light into the eye.
WALT explain that we see things because light travels from light sources to our eyes or from light sources to objects and then to our eyes.
WALT use the idea that light travels in straight lines to explain why shadows have the same shape as the objects that cast them.

WALT use a variety of media to represent light, shade, form, pattern and texture in a range of drawing work.
WALT use pen and ink to add line, tone and perspective using a tonal ink wash.
