Spoken Language

WALT: Give well-structured descriptions, explanations and narratives for different purposes

WALT: Use spoken language to develop understanding through speculating, hypothesising, imagining and exploring ideas

WALT: Participate in discussions, presentations, performances, role play, improvisations and debates WALT: Maintain attention and participate actively in collaborative conversations

Reading

WALT: Continue to apply phonic knowledge and skills as the route to decode words until automatic decoding has become embedded and reading is fluent

WALT: Read accurately by blending the sounds in words that contain the graphemes taught so far, especially recognising alternative sounds for graphemes

WALT: Read accurately words of two or more syllables that contain the same graphemes as above

WALT: Discuss the sequence of events in books and how items of information are related

WALT: Become increasingly familiar with and retelling a wider range of stories, fairy stories and traditional tales WALT: Discuss and clarify the meanings of words, linking new meanings to known vocabulary

WALT: Develop positive attitudes towards and stamina for writing by:

- writing narratives about personal experiences and those of others (real and fictional)
- writing for different purposes

WALT: Plan or say out loud what they are going to write about

WALT: participate in team games, developing simple tactics for attacking and defending

Understanding of the World **GEOGRAPHY: Physical geography**

WALT: Identify seasonal and daily weather patterns in the United WALT: Kingdom and the location of hot and cold areas of the world in relation to the Equator and the North and South Poles WALT: Use basic geographical vocabulary to refer to key physical features, including: beach, cliff, coast, forest, hill, mountain, sea, ocean, river, soil, valley, vegetation, season and weather

WALT: Identify that most living things live in habitats to which they are suited and describe how different habitats provide for the basic needs of different kinds of animals and plants, and how they depend on each other.

WALT: Describe how animals obtain their food from plants and other animals, using the idea of a simple food chain, and identify and name different sources of food.
