How can we manage our feelings?

Everyday things can affect how we feel

Things that happen during the day—like a kind word, losing a toy, or having fun with friends—can make us feel happy, sad, angry, excited, or worried. Even little things can change our mood!

Feelings can change and come in different strengths

Our feelings don't always stay the same. Sometimes we feel a little bit upset, and other times we feel really angry or super happy. Feelings can grow stronger or fade away over time.

It's important to express how we feel

Talking about our feelings helps us feel better. We can show our feelings with words, drawings, body language, or even by talking to someone we trust.

Learning to manage our feelings in different situations It's okay to feel big emotions, but it's also important to calm down and handle them in a good way—like taking deep breaths, walking away, or talking it out.

How to deal with feelings of loss, grief, or change

Sometimes sad things happen, like losing a pet, moving house, or someone we love going away. It's okay to feel sad, and there are things that can help—like talking, drawing, or spending time with people who care.

Getting help when you need it

If you're feeling really sad, angry, or worried, you don't have to handle it alone. You can talk to a parent, teacher, friend, or someone you trust. Getting support can make things feel easier.

Mathematics
