Spoken Language:

Understanding of the World

GEOGRAPHY:

WALT: Use maps, atlases, globes and digital/computer mapping to locate countries and describe features studied

WALT: Describe and understand key aspects of time geography including: types of settlement and land use, economic activity including trade links, and the distribution of natural resources including energy, food, minerals and water

WALT: Use the eight points of a compass, four and six-figure grid references, symbols and key (including the use of Ordnance Survey maps) to build their knowledge of the UK and the wider world

WALT: Locate the world's countries, using maps to focus on Europe (including the location of Russia) and North and South America, concentrating on their environmental regions, key physical and human characteristics, countries and major cities.

WALT: Name and locate counties and cities of the UK, geographical regions and their identifying human and physical characteristics, key topographical features (including hills, mountains, coasts and rivers) and land use patterns; and understand how some of these aspects have changed over time.

SCIENCE: Living things and their habitats

WALT: Recognise that living things can be grouped in a variety of ways. WALT: Explore and use classification keys to help group, identify and name a variety of living things in their local and wider environment. Ask relevant questions and use different types of scientific enquiries to answer them. WALT: Construct and interpret a variety of food chains identifying producers, predators and prey. WALT: Record findings using simple scientific language, drawings, labelled diagrams, keys bar charts and tables. WALT: Make systematic and careful observations and, where appropriate, take accurate measurements using standard units, use a range of equipment including thermometers and data loggers.

COMPUTING:

WALT: Select, use and combine a variety of software, including internet services, on a range of digital devices to design and create a range of programs, systems and content that accomplish given goals, including collecting, analysing, evaluating and presenting data and information.
