Writing

- Walt:** Write a non-chronological report on Ancient Gods
- Walt:** Write a recount on the discovery of Tutankhamun's burial tomb in The Valley of the Kings
- Walt:** Write Egyptian Mystery Stories
- Walt:** Write a short diary in role as a Pharaoh
- Walt:** Write a biography on Cleopatra

In writing narratives, consider how authors have developed characters and settings in what pupils have read, listened to or seen performed
In narratives, describe settings, characters and atmosphere and integrate dialogue to convey character and advance the action
Assess the effectiveness of their own and others' writing

Reading

- Walt:** Retrieve, record and present information from non-fiction
 - Walt:** Recommend books that they have read to their peers, giving reasons for their choices
 - Walt:** Draw inferences such as inferring characters' feelings, thoughts and motives from their actions, and justifying inferences with evidence
- Continue to read and discuss an increasingly wide range of fiction, poetry, plays, non-fiction and reference books and text books.

Physical Development

Basketball:

- Walt:** Extend appropriate basketball footwork focusing on pivoting, triple threat position on and off the ball

Place knowledge

Walt: Locate the world's countries, using maps to focus on Europe (including the location of Russia) and North and South America, concentrating on their environmental regions, key physical and human characteristics, countries and major cities

Human and physical geography

Walt: Describe and understand key aspects of:- human geography, including: types of settlement and land use, economic activity including trade links, and the distribution of natural resources including energy, food, minerals and water

Science: Living things and their habitats

Walt: recognise the stages of growth and development in humans
