Literacy

Spoken Language:

WALT: Ask relevant questions to extend their understanding and knowledge. Listen and respond appropriately to adults and their peers.

WALT: Maintain attention and participate actively in collaborative conversations, staying on topics and initiating and responding to comments

Reading:

WALT: Listen to and discuss a wide range of fiction, poetry, plays, non-fiction and reference books or text books.

WALT: Discuss and record ideas. Compose and rehearse sentences orally (including dialogue) progressively building a varied and rich vocabulary of sentence structures.

WALT: Discuss writing similar to that which they are planning to write in order to understand and learn from its structure, vocabulary and grammar.

WALT: In narratives, create settings, character and plots. Assess the effectiveness of their own and others' writing and suggest improvements.

Jungle animals

WALT: Learn nouns for jungle animals

WALT: Describe jungle animals in simple written sentences

WALT: Revisit body parts and use these to describe an animal

WALT: Use number vocabulary to identify the quantity of animals.

PSCHE: How do we manage risk in different places?

WALT: Learn how to recognise, predict, assess and manage risk in different situations

WALT: Know how to keep safe in the local environment and less familiar locations (e.g. near rail, water, road; fire/firework safety; sun safety and the safe use of digital devices when out and about)

WALT: Understand how people can be influenced by their peers' behaviour and by a desire for peer approval; how to manage this influence

WALT: Learn how people's online actions can impact on other people

WALT: Know how to keep safe online, including managing requests for personal information and recognising what is appropriate to share or not share online

WALT: Know how to report concerns, including about inappropriate online content and contact

WALT: Understand that rules, restrictions and laws exist to help people keep safe and how to respond if they become aware of a situation that is anti-social or against the law

R.E.: Buddhism - What is the best way for a Buddhist to lead a good life?

WALT: Learn how Buddha's teachings make a difference to how Buddhists choose to live.

WALT: Describe personal 'good' choices and the consequences of them. Explain the consequences of making a different choice.

WALT: Describe how aspects of the 8-fold path would help Buddhists know how to live good lives.

WALT: Discuss and explain why some aspects of the 8-fold path might be hard for some Buddhists to stick to.

GEOGRAPHY:

WALT: Use maps, atlases, globes and digital/computer mapping to locate countries and describe features studied

WALT: Describe and understand key aspects of physical geography including: climate zones, biomes and vegetation belts, rivers, mountains, volcanoes and earthquakes, and the water cycle

WALT: Describe and understand key aspects of human geography including: types of settlement and land use, economic activity including trade links, and the distribution of natural resources including energy, food, minerals and water.

HISTORY:

WALT: Learn about a non-European society that provides contrasts with British history.

SCIENCE: Electricity

WALT: Identify common appliances that run on electricity

WALT: Construct a simple series electrical circuit, identifying and naming its basic parts, including cells, wires, bulbs, switches and buzzers

WALT: Identify whether or not a lamp will light in a simple series circuit, based on whether or not the lamp is part of a complete loop with a battery

WALT: Recognise that a switch opens and closes a circuit and associate this with whether or not a lamp lights in a simple series circuit

WALT: Recognise some common conductors and insulators, and associate metals with being good conductors.

WALT: To understand what an animation is
